BACKGROUND

0

The growing adoption of digital formats by consumers, students, and professionals has enabled the growth of illicit downloading and accessing of copyrighted material produced by publishers. This is costing US publishers significant amounts of lost income. **OBJECTIVES**

study are to understand who is downloading illicit material, how and where they are doing it, and what this might represent to the industry in terms of lost sales by measuring survey data against our Books and Consumers data.

The survey was conducted online using Nielsen's sample of past 6 months e-book purchasers in the Books and Consumers survey. From there purchasers were asked about their methods of downloading e-books and a sample of 595* were identified as having pirated material.

*Sample was weighted based on a profile of illegal downloaders identified in the Books & Consumers survey

Note: This report highlights the main findings from this study, including noticeable variations by different types of respondents. There are also opportunities for further analyses against custom targets (i.e. for a specific region, or specific downloader type, etc.). The more detailed data is available to carry out additional analyses in the Toluna Analytics platform.



EXECUTIVE SUMMERY



The majority of illegal downloaders are 18 – 34 years old, educated, and wealthy.

- → More than 70% of illegal downloaders have either graduated from college or have a post college graduate degree.
- → Illegal downloaders are also slightly more likely to be 30 44 years old and to have a yearly household income of \$60k \$99k.



Roughly 30% of illegal downloaders either obtain their content from friends via IM, email, or flash drive or from downloading from public/open torrent sites.

- → Of the 13 16 e-books these illegal downloaders acquire per year, 3 7 are acquired illegally.
- → 4Shared.com is the most popular torrent site to download e-books and fiction books are the most popular genre to download.




Illegal downloads account for approximately \$315 million in lost sales to the US e-book market per year.

 \rightarrow This estimate is based on a number of assumptions that are outlined in the study. However, this number is ultimately based on self-reported data, which could underestimate the total lost sales to the book industry.







COMPARED TO LEGAL METHODS, FINDING E-BOOKS IS FASTEST WHEN OBTAINING THEM FROM FRIENDS













Total e-book Purchasing Population	 The Books & Consumers Survey interviews representative sample of book purchasers in the US. A screener question for the study asks respondents the number of books purchased in the past year by format. 30% of the nationally representative sample said they had purchased an e-book in the past year. Projecting that up to the total US market, we are assuming that there are 75M e-books purchasers in a given year.
% of Illegal e-Book Purchases	 Based on the number of respondents who qualified for this study, 22% of e-book acquirers were identified as having illegally acquired an e-book in the past 12 months. Caveat: This figure is based on self-reported illegal downloading. There is a potential that this figure underrepresents the total number of illegal downloaders in the US.





% of Illegal e-Book Downloaders who would have Purchased the e-Book Legally

- An illegal e-book download is not always directly equivalent to the loss of a legal e-book purchase.
- While the majority of illegal downloaders said that if they had not been able to find an e-book using their preferred illegal method, they would have found it illegally elsewhere, there was still a sizeable portion who said that they would have purchased the e-book legally.
- Therefore, we are only considering the population who said that they would have legally purchased the e-book or 33% of respondents in the survey.



Methods for Illegally Downloading e-Books	 For this study, there are three distinct methods for illegally downloading e-books considered: from open/public cyberlockers, from resale sites (e.g., eBay), or from friends. Amongst illegal e-book downloaders, the percent using these methods are: Downloaded from cyberlockers / torrent sites: 51% Obtained from friends: 45% Acquired from online auction/resale sites: 27% Caveat: There are potentially other methods to illegally download e-books not included in this study. This could have an impact on the actual number of e-books downloaded.
Number of e-books downloaded per method	 Illegal downloaders self-reported the number of e-books that they downloaded in the past 12 months based on the method for downloading. Caveat: This figure is self-reported and could under or over estimate the actual number of e-books they download.

Average price of an e-book

- Using the data collected over the past year for the Books & Consumer study, the point-of-sale e-book price that consumers pay was calculated.
- This price was calculated to be \$9.98
